

As EPA Administrator, the former New Jersey Governor promoted common-sense environmental improvements such as



watershed-based water protection policies. She championed regulations requiring non-road diesel engines to reduce sulfur emissions by more than 95 percent. During her tenure, the Administration was successful in passing and implementing brownfields legislation to promote redevelopment and reuse of previously contaminated industrial sites. She also instituted the well-regarded National Water Quality Trading program, bringing the power of market forces to bear in realizing water quality improvements.

RA Jim Seif's Interview Joins Oral History Collection

Read or listen to Jim Seif's reflections on his career in environmental protection, beginning as an entry-level attorney in Region III's Legal Branch, just after the Agency was formed. Jim's involvement with the Agency continued during his years in the private sector and as Secretary of Pennsylvania's Department of Environmental Protection. Jim served as



Regional Administrator during Bill Ruckelshaus's second tour with the Agency and under Administrator Lee M. Thomas. Self also looks to the future and how to address remaining environmental problems:

"So many other problems, however, are not amenable to either throwing money or enforcement muscle at them. Teachin' and preachin', back to Lee Thomas's term. Education in the long run, meaning societal education, not just turning out people with degrees on how to invent anti-pollution devices. It means the setting up of incentives. Taxes, yes,

although I hesitate to become a tax

lawyer. That's a bad enough situation as it is, with complexity and so on. But other kinds of incentives like putting a pollutant on a market like CO2 or SO2, which after all was a very successful example from George H.W. Bush."

Jim's interview joins histories provided by Lee Thomas, Bill Ruckelshaus, Hank Habicht, early leaders of the Drinking Water Program, Ron Brand discussing early challenges of the Underground Storage Tank Program, and Chuck Elkins account of the development of Reorganization Plan #3, which created EPA. Additional oral histories are in development, including an interview with Former Administrator Bill Reilly and with former Commissioner of the Federal Water Pollution Control Administration in the Interior Department in the late 60's, David D.
